Major Grants

These capacity-building grants support nonprofit organizations working to improve the lives and well-being of residents by improving education; addressing diversity, equity and inclusion; and fostering the development of safe, strong and sustainable communities. In 2022, The PPL Foundation awarded \$500,000 in grants to support 17 organizations working to empower the communities they serve in eastern and central Pennsylvania.

- African American Museum of Bucks County in Langhorne received a grant of \$25,000 to support the development of video programming and educational events featuring the untold stories and hidden figures of Bucks County.
- American Rescue Workers in Williamsport received a grant of \$50,000 to support the installation of a kitchen in the men's shelter to provide a space that helps skills development.
- Black Heritage Association of the Lehigh Valley
 received a grant of \$25,000 for a digital inclusion
 initiative that will provide broadband access to
 families in Allentown and Lehigh County to help bridge
 the digital divide.
- Children's Museum in Bloomsburg received \$27,500 for a STEM ambassador program and conference focused on increasing girls' interest and participation in science, technology, engineering and math.
- For the Cause in Berwick received \$25,000 for the development of a youth entrepreneur academy that aims to provide career exploration and hands-on learning experiences outside of the classroom.

- Friends of the Columbia County Traveling Library in Columbia County received \$25,000 to support the creation of a literacy cooperative that includes public librarians, school librarians, elementary reading teachers, middle and high school English language arts teachers, and preschool teachers in a coordinated effort to encourage literacy and to provide books and e-resources to the children of Columbia County.
- Lancaster Area Habitat for Humanity received \$25,000 to support the Open Doors initiative that aims to expand access to affordable housing and engage more of the community to participate in the housing solution through volunteer efforts.
- Lancaster County Career and Technology Foundation received \$27,500 to support the expansion of a successful summer camp focused on careers and technical education.
- New Bethany in Bethlehem received \$20,000 to provide housing advocacy and service navigation assistance to help low-income households obtain and maintain safe and stable housing.

- O.S. Johnson Technical Institute in Scranton received \$65,000 for the creation of a STEM learning lab to serve students in four school districts in Northeast Pennsylvania.
- Pocono Mountains United Way in Stroudsburg received \$25,000 for Generation NEXT, a program that ensures first-generation and underserved students receive the support they need to access higher education.
- The Century Promise in Allentown received \$25,000 for a public-private engagement program that brings together business and college communities in developing collaborative solutions to prepare Allentown graduates to be college, career and community ready.

 The Cooperage Project in Honesdale received \$25,000 to support engaging afterschool programming serving students in three school districts in Wayne County.

- The Kindness Project in Emmaus received \$25,000 to support foster families and the children in their care across eastern Pennsylvania by supplying clothing, shoes, furniture and other essential items free of charge.
- The Lancaster Science Center received \$30,000 for the development of a new interactive exhibit that teaches students about sustainable energy resources.
- The Urban Regenerative Farm in Harrisburg received \$35,000 for a program that transforms abandoned city lots into income-generating, community-run vegetable gardens.
- Valley Youth House in Bethlehem received \$20,000 to support the renovation of a youth shelter, ensuring that the children being served have a safe space that meets their emergency needs.

In December 2022, the foundation awarded more than \$500,000 in funding to support 29 nonprofit organizations working to improve the lives and well-being of individuals throughout the Ocean State.

The foundation's latest investments support initiatives such as tutoring and mentoring programs for underserved students; a multigenerational community design studio; innovative and affordable housing programs; and environmental conservation and education programs that inspire the next generation of stewards.

PPL employee giving campaigns raise nearly **\$8 million** with strong support from PPL Foundation

PPL employees and retirees joined forces company-wide to raise more than \$8 million during the company's annual employee giving campaigns.

The record-breaking amount raised will support ongoing efforts to address the increasing needs of thousands of people who rely on the United Way and local organizations for countless vital services every day.

Additionally, more than 200 employees volunteered their time in the community during PPL's Day of Caring events in September, directly impacting organizations in communities throughout the 29 Pennsylvania counties served by PPL Electric Utilities.

Vincent Sorgi, president and chief executive officer of PPL Corporation, and his wife Michelle served as co-chairs of the United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley's 2022 Campaign.

PPL's United Way campaign raised \$2.75 million in in Pennsylvania and Rhode Island contributions from employees and retirees. The PPL Foundation matched those contributions 100%.

As part of the 2022 campaign, the PPL Foundation partnered with The United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley to create the "Be a Housing Hero" initiative to support families facing housing insecurity. In honor of the campaign, the PPL Foundation contributed an additional \$500,000 to match every new and increased donation to the UWGLV campaign, bringing the campaign total to over \$6 million.

Support for Education

Cover to Cover

More than 8,600 students in grades K-3 experienced the joy of summer reading through PPL Foundation's Cover to Cover reading program.

Nearly 9,000 new books were donated to 20 summer reading programs throughout PPL Electric's 29-county service area.

Empowering Educators

The PPL Foundation's Empowering Educators program is designed to help K-12 teachers provide hands-on learning opportunities to enhance the classroom experience and spark students' interest in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

Powering a Brighter Future Scholarships

The scholarship program aims to advance diversity, equity and inclusion and attract more women and minorities to careers in engineering, information technology, and tech and trade roles.

The scholarship program awards \$100,000 annually to students pursuing degrees in these fields at qualifying colleges, universities, and technical schools.
